So as not to bury the lead...

Introducing a first-of-its-kind youth apprenticeship... CareerWise New York!

In our last newsletter we highlighted CareerWise Colorado, a youth apprenticeship program based on the Swiss apprenticeship model. Now, in partnership with the Colorado team, HERE to HERE is gearing up to incubate a pilot program to connect up to 80 public high school students with three-year apprenticeships in IT, finance, and business operations pathways. Participating students will receive paid work experience as well as college credit and an industry-recognized credential during the three year program, while employers will see a positive return on investment and gain the opportunity to cultivate tomorrow's workforce.

Thanks to the 14 employers and 16 schools and counting that have committed to helping us stand up our first cohort. The incredible leadership of the Business Council, swift engagement of high school principals and advisors, and leadership and enthusiasm of Chancellor Richard Carranza with NYCDOE has allowed us to work on an ambitious scale and timeline. We will be making an official announcement

before our first cohort begins in August. If you are interested in learning more please contact Barb Chang at bchang@heretohere.org.

We're also gearing up to launch the Bronx Private Industry Council!

In December the leadership of the Bronx Private Industry Council (PIC) Task Force employers, the Bronx Borough President, and H2H decided to deepen their commitment to Bronx students and employers by agreeing to officially launch the Bronx PIC in spring 2019. It May Be Spring but We're Already Gearing up for Summer with SYEP

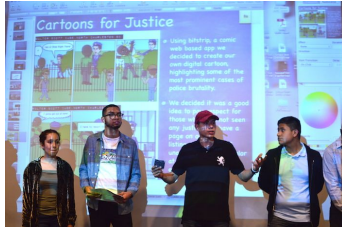
This summer, six of our network high schools will participate in the SYEP school-based initiative (SBI). BASE, Bronx International, Dream Yard Prep, Fannie Lou Hamer, HERO high and the Laboratory School of Finance and Technology will collectively offer 600 paid opportunities to Bronx students. With so many of our network schools participating in SYEP-SBI, we have an exciting opportunity to document the initiative, expand the number of students participating in paid internships and experiences, and shape program operations for summers to come.



Wildlife Conservation Society is Broadening Student Opportunity

We're excited to support WCS in expanding student hires and career pathways to long-term employment. Over the next two years, WCS will work directly with high schools in the H2H network to recruit and train students for seasonal work and internships. WCS, a new CareerClue provider, will also work specifically with Comp Sci High to provide paid work experience, skill-development, and mentorship.

As a part of their work to build out student hiring, WCS invited H2H network high school students to a job interview fair last week, where they learned more about available opportunities at Bronx Zoo, Central Park Zoo, and the New York Aquarium. Over 160 students were interviewed and over 300 have applied for spring and summer work. So far, 65 students have been extended offers!

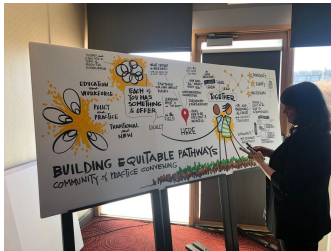


Building Digital Media Career Pathways for Bronx Youth at EVC

The Educational Video Center (EVC) is a non-profit youth media organization dedicated to developing the artistic, critical literacy, and career skills of young people while nurturing their commitment to social change. EVC's Digital Media Career Pathways gives Bronx Community College students the opportunity to participate in programming while earning college credit.

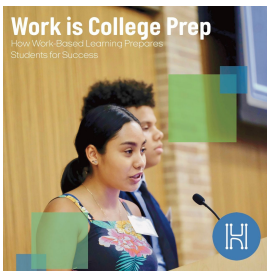
In partnership with H2H, EVC is enhancing its Media Career Pathways program by developing career pathway tools and highlighting CUNY programs with a record for driving students toward rewarding, media arts careers. Placing particular focus on BCC, Hostos, BMCC, Brooklyn College, Lehman, Hunter, City College, Baruch, EVC aims to grow CUNY's college-to-career pipeline.

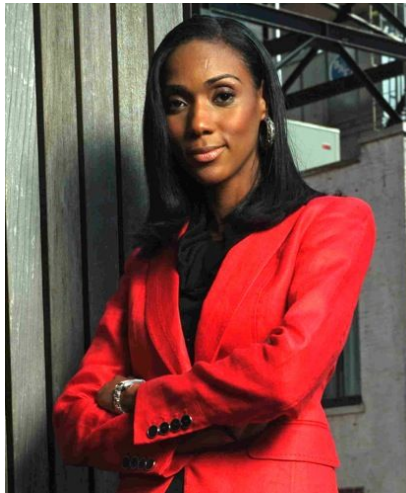
Workforce Systems Leadership Conference

Fannie Lou Hamer Street Renamed

Last year, to mark 100 years since civil rights activist, Fannie Lou Hamer's birth, students wrote petitions, mailed letters, and publicly advocated to organize a name change. In February, in honor of Black History Month, Fannie Lou students were joined by Assemblyman Marcos Crespo and Councilman Rafael Salamanca in a special event to rename West Farms Road after the school's namesake, Mrs. Fannie Lou Hamer. We were thrilled to stand with students and educators on such a monumental day.



H2H Visit to the Metropolitan Regional Career and Technical Center

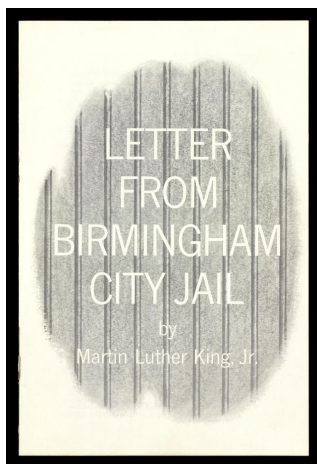
In January, H2H visited the Metropolitan Regional Career and Technical Center (MET) in Providence, where we accompanied students to their internship sites, sat in on an advisory class, and got an inside view on how the MET uses work-based learning and a student-centered approach to foster learning. We talked to so many passionate students who are tapping their in-school learning to enrich their interests, including one student who even created a youth sex education class while interning at Planned Parenthood and has since become a certified sex educator and educates within her school.

Paya Conference

The Partnership to Advance Youth Apprenticeship (PAYA) is a multi-year initiative that supports access to high-quality apprenticeships for high school students. In March, we attended a PAYA convening alongside community leaders, educators, employers, and policymakers to learn about current apprenticeship programs. We saw a culinary apprenticeship operating in real-time at Trident Technical College (and the mammoth chocolate structures apprentices have made), heard from leading practitioners, and took key insights back to New York to help H2H prepare for the launch of CareerWise New York.



Letter from a Birmingham Jail

Last month, H2H took a deep dive into the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's Letter from a Birmingham Jail. The intention of this exercise was to connect and ground ourselves in the work for racial justice. Since last fall, we've been working with the Equity Lab to deepen our collective understanding of racism and white supremacy, so that we are increasingly equipped to dismantle it. Our staff brought great focus, love, and openness to our study of the letter.

We highly recommend giving this letter a thoughtful read.



CUNY screening of Unlikely You

CUNY recently organized a screening of *Unlikely U*, a documentary that reveals the fundamental challenges of postsecondary education, why elite schools aren't the answer, and how schools like UMBC, Arizona State, and Georgia State are supporting and graduating more students through their open admissions policies.



The film features key leaders in the postsecondary space including Freeman Hrabowski, Michael Crow, Nancy Cantor, and Timothy Renick, and places focus not just on getting students into and through college, but on post-grad employability, economic mobility, and other critical postsecondary outcomes.
